After 32 years in the parish I have arrived at the conclusion that ministry (stewardship included) really comes down to one basic thing: **taking care of people**. Everything else follows from this, or not. While the caring part has not changed much over the course of the past two millennia, the past two years have brought *great* changes

in our understanding of just who, exactly, constitutes the people. Owing to the live-stream, our well-read and utilized newsletter, weekly emailing of the sermon, and the nature of our society, a great many more people may (joyously) lay claim to "belonging" to our church in whatever way each person chooses to understand it. This is simply the

changing nature of church, both as a concept and as an expression. What I believe makes our church unique, is our ability to embrace the grace of this change.

In essence, we have allowed our church to be "customized" for use and participation to the individual resulting in a sum which is miraculously greater than our ever-diversifying parts. It follows, then, that each person consider their own unique role is supporting the church in a way which corresponds to the care they receive, how they receive it, and their own distinctive (and/or quirky) sense of belonging to the Church on the Park. I am absolutely certain that God has big plans for our church, and that each one of us will be part of such a plan unfolding even now.
