The Pastor's Report

Yep, it is still winter; but we are close. I trust that these words find you all well, my sisters and brothers, and that you are "keeping on keeping on."

At a time of year when it seems that change simply will not come, we are actual-

ly on the cusp of a great deal of change in our church.

Though we must still be vigilant in our efforts to address COVID, beginning this Sunday masking at church will be **"Welcome But Not Required."** Owing to recent CDC guidelines and a down-

turn in infection rates in the county (which will continue, hopefully) the Session is taking a realistic, though optimistic, approach to safeguarding all of the folks in our congregation; both young and old. As this is a fluid situation, we will continue to assess the circumstance each month and act with whatever liberality the science and common sense allows.

Ultimately, though, such decisions are not the sole purview of the Session (or any any form/level of government or authority). I would like to remind us all of these words from the very first pages of our denomination's "Book of Order" (i.e., the rule book):

G-1.0301 Right of Judgment

(1) (a) That ``God alone is Lord of the conscience, and hath left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men (*sic*) which are in anything contrary to God's Word, or beside it, in matters of faith or worship."

(b) Therefore we consider the rights of private judgment, in all matters that respect religion, as universal and unalienable. The notion of **Religious Liberty** is a seminal and foundational tenet of our tradition which dates back to 1788. Given the history and origin of our nation as a colony under British rule, it is no surprise that this belief would occupy such an important

position and role in the establishment and propagation of our denomination (several signers of the Declaration of Independence were "prominent" Presbyterians).

Though often conveniently overlooked or ignored by some who trumpet Religious Liberty, such a privilege is

always accompanied by an equal portion of **Religious Responsibility**. The act of balancing the two, therefore, has always been a tricky conundrum given that life, and its circumstances, is always a fluid situation. This is particularly the case, now, during this time of COVID when our One nation under God is so bitterly divided.

While there has certainly been much strife and consternation as regards these matters, with such turbulence comes great opportunity. The opportunity to be gracious within oneself, and to extend graciousness to our neighbors. Let us recognize and respect that each person is on their own journey, and have both **the right and the responsibility** to act in accord with their own conscience *before God*.

In the days and weeks ahead, in our church, community and larger world, folks will be making their own decisions about any number of issues...including masking. Let us regard each other with the respect due each and every child of God.

We are close, Rev. Mike





Church & Community Program PANTRY WINTER WISH LIST

Our pantry serves neighbors in need from the Towns of Canton, Clare, DeKalb, Hermon, Lisbon and Russell, and the Village of Heuvelton. People may pick up food twice a month. We welcome donations of unexpired, unopened food, including this list of special needs. Thank you!

Fresh fruits & vegetables

We get plenty of canned fruits and vegetables but don't often have fresh ones this time of year. When there's a 2 for 1 sale, please donate to the pantry.

What's for lunch?

How about some hearty soup and crackers? Favorites include: chicken noodle and minestrone. Mac & cheese, stew, canned meat, and peanut butter also are popular.

Snacks

Everyone needs a little treat. Granola bars, cookies, graham crackers, cake mix and frosting, or brownies make our families smile.

Homeless

We see people who have been evicted, lost a home to fire, are just released from jail, etc. They often are temporarily placed in motels, without freezers or ovens. Foods that they can carry, such as pop top cans, single-serving foods, small drinks, and microwaveable items are a big help.

To donate food, please drop it off from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday through Friday at 30 Court St. Thank you very much!

Personal Care

Food is the priority of our pantry, but we know that personal care products are expensive; many families have to skimp on these necessities. We are seeking bars of soap, shampoo, deodorant, toothpaste, toothbrushes. We also package these items with food and manual can openers for homeless or displaced people, so every donation is much appreciated.

Pets are family, too



When money is tight, it can be hard to feed the family and even more difficult to purchase pet food. Sometimes a pet is the only friend a child has, or it means to the world to a senior. To help ease that heartache, we're adding small amounts of cat and dog food to our inventory for families in emergencies.

It's expensive, so we're not asking you to donate lots of it every week, but please pick up a couple of extra cans or a small bag of pet food when you are already getting it for your pets.



Swing The Bell?

Mike would like to float the idea of undertaking an effort to get the bell in the steeple of our church up and swinging again!

Though most are unaware, many years ago (before the memory of any) the bell was disabled so as to make it incapable of swinging. In its current state we can "toll" the bell, but we cannot "peal" the bell. A "toll" is a mournful sound typically associated with death and sorrow (as in "for whom the bell tolls"). In contrast, a "peal" is a joyous and exuberant sound which results from swinging a bell back and forth (as in peals of laughter).

While we do yet know when the bell was disabled (research ongoing) we now know why. Recently we had a representative from White's Clock and Carillon Northeast make a cold-call on the church. After speaking to them, Barry Walch and Rev. Mike decided it wouldn't hurt to have them take a look and see what it would cost to restore the bell so it could swing once more. Soon after, an inspection was made (numerous photos were taken and can be viewed by clicking HERE) and we received a quote of \$8k to get the bell up and swinging again. This would include replacing the existing wooden wheel (now over 100 years old) with a custom metal wheel, and replacing the existing "A-stands" with new custom stands (with new roller bearings) upon which the bell sits and swivels. The photo the right shows where one of the existing stands is cracked, which almost certainly led to the bell being disabled for safety sake, and the existing large wooden wheel to be replaced.

On the "up-side" the inspection determined that the bell itself is in excellent condition, as is the clapper. Though it would be a major overhaul, the fix itself is quite simple. The new materials would be fabricated offsite, and installation would be a matter of days. White's Clock and Carillon Northeast has done work on the Ogdensburg City Hall, and in Pulaski, Homer and Laconia (click HERE to go to their website).

Now, though, we come to the most important question, "Why should we do this?" Frankly, it has been many decades, generations even, since the sound of our bell has been heard joyously ringing in the park, through the village and across the fields. It is the heart of our congregation that is the wellspring of our work and mission as a church, not bells and whistles (pun intended).

That said, the lessons gleaned from the recent restoration of the fountain in the Park have shown us what we already knew to be true: symbols matter a great deal, as does pride of place, and honoring our history as a means of forging our future. Though difficult to measure, the intangible value of undertaking such an effort to "Swing the Bell!" would surely be known and felt in our own generation, and echo mightily in those generations to follow.

Beyond the obvious theological symbolism of enabling us to, once again, "make a joyful noise unto the Lord" so as to counter the often somber tones of life which are too often heard, the most poignant answers to the question, "Why should we do this?' are to be found in the words of Martha L. Manley, in her humble letter to her "Dear Pastor." Below you will find a short history of the bells which have hung in our steeple, including the one which currently resides there even now and ever so quietly.

Finally, be assured this IS a *crazy* idea, but not one without merit. Just how much merit, however, will be for each of us to decide. Another lesson learned from the Fountain restoration is that while a few big donations pave the way, it is the might of many which carries the day. If folks are willing, we can give this a try; knowing there is no rush. If we don't raise enough, we will simply return each donation and take satisfaction in having tried. Let us, each, take it to the Lord in prayer.

The Church Bell

"History of The First Presbyerian Church, Canton NY" by Rev. W.H. Stubbledine, 1907

The first bell owned by the congregation was purchased by the women, the money for which was raised at a fair, held in the old Town Hall on Court Street. The bell was hung in 1851. Owing to a flaw in the casting the bell soon lost its tone and in 1858 was exchanged for another. Sweet and loud were its notes as across village and field it pealed forth its welcome invitation to attend the service of the sanctuary of the Lord.

In 1876 after it had been decided to build a new church the members assembled to dismantle the church. Fifty times did the bell toll the knell of the church beneath. Reverent hands lifted it from its resting place and conveyed it to a temporary shelter, until God should crown the efforts of the people with success in their great undertaking. After a year of silence, upon the completion of the church, the bell was again placed in position and once again called the people to worship and service.

For twenty-five years longer the bell called the people to the House of God. "For nine years its voice had lost its sweetness and year by year it grew more husky and indistinct," until it finally sounded more like clanging brass whose discordant notes jarred upon the nerves. Reluctantly the old bell was discarded.

In the year 1901 Mrs. Martha L. Manley informed the Ladies' Aid Society of the church, of which she was a member, that she would present the church with a bell (on certain simple conditions) in honor of her lamented husband, Gilbert B.Manley. The conditions were readily agreed to and a bell weighing ten hundred and eighty-six pounds was contracted for at a cost of three hundred and seventy-five dollars.

Inscribed upon the bell is the following:

Presented to the Presbyterian Church, Canton, New York In memory of Gilbert B. Manley, by his wife, Martha L., A. D., 1902. "Let him that heareth say come."

The following letter from Mrs. Manley was read at the dedication of the bell:


My Dear Pastor:

It is with no small degree of pleasure that I present to the First Presbyterian Church, Canton, so dear to the heart of my late husband and myself, this memorial bell, which seems to me a fitting token, both to the House of God and to its departed friend and benefactor, who was so seldom absent from its gatherings, which knew him once but shall know him no more forever. May its notes ring pure and true, and I trust that sometime when they ring out on the calm still air, the people will recognize in them the voice calling them to worship in their beautiful sanctuary. I trust also that pastor and people may hear in them a call of love, tenderness and encouragement, that shall unite them in thought and spirit, and bind them with cords of consideration, mutual helpfulness, and earnest effort, so essential to the fullest realization of the true work of any House of Worship, the Lord's work, a work that was so near and dear, and withal lovely to the man in whose memory the bell is given. Altho I shall never hear its tones I feel that each Sabbath their echoes will penetrate the gloom of my darkened room, dispelling in a measure its inevitable clouds and perhaps revealing to me glimpses of its silver lining. May the gift be accepted as from a sincere and loving friend. - Martha L. Manley
